COURSE CONTENT

Key Areas

- technical developments that impact on everyday life, for example, in transport, work, communication and the military
- developments in the field of work such as automatization, the gig economy, globalization and localization and work-life balance
- environmental changes and the threats and opportunities they offer
- health and fitness
- social developments relevant to the current and future generations such as consumer behaviour, social interaction, equality, or questions of identity

AIMS OF THE MODULE

You will finish the course being able to

- describe and explain verbally and in writing ideas concerning various current and future developments
- competently debate and discuss controversial events
- present your thoughts and ideas clearly in the form of a 15-minute presentation and argumentative texts
- read and understand topical texts concerning current and future affairs
- make accurate notes and use them to produce written summaries develop your listening skills using a variety of audio texts

METHODOLOGY

To achieve these aims you will

- read and listen to relevant source material, make notes on them and debate their contents
- write an ongoing portfolio with which you will improve your writing
- take part in regular debates and discussions on current affairs
- explain, describe, analyze, summarize, agree, disagree, create logical outlines and conclusions, formulate coherent arguments
- draw on knowledge gained in other faculties

PRACTICAL DETAILS

GET is a module aimed at students from all faculties.

Successfully completing this course will get you 4 credit points towards your Bachelor, refresh your SLP or simply improve your English.

The entry requirement is an SLP (HMLS) of 3332,

LENGTH OF THE COURSE AND COURSE TIMES

The course runs for 3 terms: autumn 2021, winter 2022 and spring 2022.

90 minutes per week Tuesday 11:30 – 13:00, Wednesday 14:00-15:30, and 135 minutes over 2 terms Friday 08:30-11:00

There will be a homework assignment each week. Typically, this will involve reading, writing, listening, note-taking or a piece of research. This assignment is integral to the course and counts towards your Bachelor points.

CREDIT POINTS

- successfully complete a 15-minute oral exam consisting of a presentation and discussion
- successfully complete a continually assessed writing portfolio compiled during the course
